Rabbi Anthony Fratello

Rabbi Fratello, Temple Shaarei Shalom, graduated from Pomona College in 1994 with a BA in History, and then began his studies toward the Rabbinates at the Jerusalem Campus of the Hebrew Union College. He continued his studies at the Cincinnati campus of HUC-JIR in 1995. Rabbi Fratello earned his MA in Hebrew Letters from the Hebrew Union College in 1998 and was ordained as a Rabbi in June 1999. Rabbi Fratello has served as a member of the Board of the Mandel Jewish Community Center of the Palm Beaches and the Friedman Commission for Jewish Education.



Rabbi Michael Klein

Rabbi Klein, Temple Torat Emet, is a native Miamian. He received a BS in Biology and Chemistry from the University of Miami in 1975 and an MS in Biochemistry from Florida University in 1983. He completed a successful 37 year career in education serving as a teacher, Department Chairman and Assistant Principal. He attended Yeshiva College of South Florida and has served as Torah Reader, Hebrew Teacher, Hazaan, and Spiritual Leader of various synagogues throughout South Florida. He joined Torat Emet in 2015 as Ritual Director and B'Nei Mitzvah instructor. Rabbi Klein completed his Rabbinic studies at Yeshiva/Mesifita Adas Wolkowisk in July 2020.

Rabbi Shub, Temple Beth Tikvah, was born in Toronto, Canada. Mordecai Kaplan's rationalistic analysis of Judaism and the Jewish people, and his formula for collective survival, were drawn from the social sciences rather than tradition or philosophy. Eugene Borowitz's existentialist approach stressed the religious needs of the individual rather than the collective. Abraham Joshua Heschel expressed traditional faith and observance in a modern idiom. Where were they perceptive and where did they miscalculate in their prescriptions for American Judaism? There will be open discussion and class members will be encouraged to think about where they stand in relation to the issues raised.

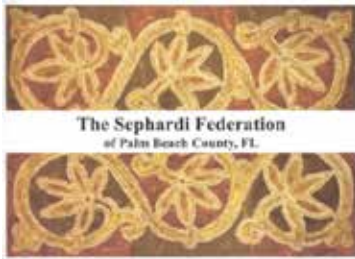

MONDAY – ROBERT ALTABET Sephardic Culture LECTURE, 2-4PM Feb. 28

When the Torah spoke in Spanish. The first Torah commentary in a vernacular. Meam Loetz – The Torah Anthology was initiated in Ladino in 1730 with the launch of commentary on Bereishit-Genesis by Isaac Kuli. Ultimately, the entire Torah was completed according to Kuli’s plan after he died over the next 50 years. This became a staple in every Sephardic Synagogue in the Ottoman empire. In the 1960s it was translated into Hebrew and English. While it is an anthology of virtually every commentator on each verse and section, it also contains original insights by each of the 5 authors. We will look at the historical context that prompted this popular work and explore some of the Torah insights by the authors and by some of the lesser-known sources.
